Yesterday, Val's daughter Carin and grand kid, Marco visited the church of San Xavier Del Bac in South Tucson which was built in the late 1600's by Jesuit and later Franciscan priests at what is now the Tohono O' odham Nation. It's a small church that has been restored to the simple beauty found in carvings in many churches in the Southwest. Sitting in a pew inside the Chapel, I wondered at the amazing carvings and statues that decorated the Alter and Chancel area.

The members of the congregation, along with federal and local help had restored the inside and outer fascia of this very old building. Looking up at the paintings, frescos and carvings continually restored by those who loved that Church, I realized the time, labor, patience, sweat, tears, and faith it must have taken to build and rebuild the simple beauty of that little church at least three times in its history. The faith of those Mexican Americans, Native Americans and Anglos like you and me made it happen ~ with God's help. It's that faith and determination that give birth to churches and keeps them alive. It's also that same energy which drives us to work to keep Molt Church alive and doing what God has called us to do. As I looked at that creation by God and his people, I found myself saying quietly, "We can do that too."





Mission Project excerpt from You & Me Camp Letter:

"The only money you will need at camp will be for a special mission offering at our closing worship. This special offering will go to help our neighbors who have been impacted by recent flooding. Our special mission project will be collecting cleaning supplies for disaster buckets to aide in clean up. If you would like to help in this mission, bring cleaning supplies for the buckets. We will collect the supplies, create the buckets, and I will deliver them to the Conference Office for distribution. We will also collect gas cards or donations for gas cards to assist with volunteer travel expenses as they assist in cleanup. I have included a list of items for the bucket. We will assemble what we gather, and Molt Church will arrange to complete the project."

Molt Church and You & Me Camp campers invite you to help with this project. Enclosed is an explanation and a list of items which are needed for the Clean-up buckets.

Here is the list for building a Disaster Clean-up Bucket. Trudi will begin the project as she leads You & Me Camp July 5-8. She will arrange to have buckets at Molt and Rapelje for folks who wish to contribute items on the list from this week until July 18. She will then make the number of buckets she can get from the items collected and fill in missing items. The buckets will be taken to the Conference Office for distribution. A special offering will be taken at Camp for purchase of gas cards to help with travel expenses for volunteers and for those helping with clean up as well as for folks who have added travel due to road closures, etc. As needs become clear, another fundraiser will be held to help with further needs. Trudi will collect donations for the gas cards from anyone interested in helping out. Donations may be sent to Molt Church c/o Trudi Downer PO Box 81, Molt MT 59057. Just use the list of items to create the buckets; we will collect donations and distribute the buckets and donations in our area rather than sending everything through CWS.



CLEANUP BUCKET LIST

Hurricanes, floods and other disasters are happening more frequently. When our neighbors around the world experience these unforeseen circumstances, you can make the road to recovery easier with CWS Cleanup Buckets. These buckets are full of essential home recovery supplies that are needed after a disaster strikes. NEW for 2022: CWS is requesting that you add an air freshener to each bucket. Several of the liquid items have updated ounce ranges to make it easier for you to find the cleaning supplies.

SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- One five-gallon bucket with resealable lid (If reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Advertisement on the outside acceptable.)
- NEW One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener
- □ Five scouring pads (No stainless steel or pads with soap in them. Remove from packaging.)
- Seven sponges, including one large
- □ One scrub brush (With or without handle.)
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose dry cleaning towels (No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. Remove from packaging.)
- □ One 32-64oz. or two 25oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
- □ One 16-34oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap
- One 12-40oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (No spray bottles.)
- □ One package of 36-50 clothespins
- ☐ One 50-100ft. clothesline (Cotton or plastic line.)
- □ Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; No surgical masks.)
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple-use. Remove from packaging.)
- □ One pair of work gloves (Cotton with leather palm or all leather.)
- 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (Remove from packaging.)
- One 6-9oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (Pump spay bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes also acceptable.)

All cleaning items must be new and all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment. Snap the lid on tight and seal with packing tape.
