# Greetings from Pastor Anne

Dear friends in Christ,

We continue walking with Jesus through the gospel of Luke, learning and growing in our call to be disciples. We hear about Jesus' radical call to orient ourselves in accordance with God's will, wherever that may lead us. Our gospel lessons for this month are taken from Chapters 10, 11, and 12 of Luke.

Chapter 10 begins with Jesus sending out his followers two by two to go ahead of him to the places where he planned to travel. He instructed them to travel lightly and to be so focused that they did not stop to greet anyone along the way. Once they arrived at their destination, they were to enter a house and say, "Peace to this house." Then they were to get to work healing and proclaiming that the kingdom of God has come near. They were to expect hospitality and, if the town did not welcome them, they were to shake its dust off their feet in protest.

Further in Chapter 10, we come to one of the most famous of Jesus' parables, the one usually titled "The Parable of the Good Samaritan." It is a story that challenges and expands the definition of "neighbor." The ends with Jesus visiting the home of Martha and Mary, who both welcome them in their own way. But what sort of welcome is Jesus seeking, and which one provides it? We should pause and reflect on the worries and distractions that may provide obstacles to our authentic discipleship and our ability to welcome Jesus into our own lives.

Our lives as disciples must be shaped by prayer. In Chapter 11, one of Jesus' disciples asks Jesus to teach them how to pray, just as John the Baptist had taught his disciples how to pray. Jesus tells them to pray in a way no teacher had ever previously taught, beginning by referring to God as "Father," praising the holiness of God's name, asking for the coming of God's kingdom, petitioning for one's needs, and seeking God's forgives just as we forgive others. He then describes the need to be persistent in prayer, recognizing both that persistence nurtures our relationship with God and enables us to recognize God's expansive goodness.

We end the month with one parable from Chapter 12 sometimes titled, "The Parable of the Rich Fool." It asks us to look at the things we treasure, to see whether we have spent our lives foolishly gathering up riches for ourselves rather than spending our efforts on the things of God. The fool wishes to eat, drink, and be merry, delighting in his wealth and taking no account of God in his plans. Compare the "rich fool" and the "good Samaritan." The kingdom of God is one where things are turned upside down.

As we travel with Jesus this month, consider how these readings speak to you. How are you called to respond to their messages of hospitality, persistence in prayer, and seeking to live in accordance with God's plans? How can we better welcome both friends and strangers that

we encounter? How do we develop a better relationship with God through prayer, and how can we be persistent when our prayers seem unanswered? How does our relationship with our possessions proclaim our understanding of God and God's plans?

# HIGHLIGHTS May 10, 2022 – Church Council Minutes (excerpts)

The meeting was opened with prayer by Pastor Anne. Council Members present were Barb Millett, Ron McPhee, Deane Bjerke, Don Scantling, Larry Gerard, Judy Firnekas and Kathleen McPhee.

The Minutes of the April 12 meeting were reviewed and approved. The financial statements for April and the investment accounts as of April 30 were reviewed and approved.

Pastor Anne has spent time in California with Scott as he continues to struggle with illness. She plans to return to California on May 16, returning to Buffalo before Pentecost, the first Sunday in June. Mary Lett and Eric Sack will join Union Congregational during the worship service on Pentecost.

Buildings and Grounds. Great Divide inspected the parsonage furnace and will get a bid to Larry this week for installing a bigger furnace to provide heat and air conditional for both levels of the parsonage. Mike Keller will do the lawn care this summer. Eric also has offered to clean up and mow the second church lot when necessary. The Council briefly discussed the addition of a dog run/kennel about 10' x 12' for Pastor Anne's dogs. The sprinkler system in the parsonage yard is to be turned on for the summer.

Mission Committee: Gifts have been given to the Adopted Family and a donation was given to the Buffalo Ministerial Association.

Worship Committee: The Committee continues to work with the Council to provide pulpit supply for worship services during Pastor Anne's absence. The Committee also has arranged for musicians to fill in during John Egan's extended bike trip.

Old Business: The Council approved a contract with Greg Haas for five hours time to update the internet system and to update Union Congregational's social media.

New Business: Women's Fellowship plans to host a salad luncheon on June 7 for St. Luke's Lutheran and St. Luke's Episcopal women's groups as a celebration of the tremendous response given to support Ukrainian refugees. In addition, UCC's Women's Fellowship's summer project will be to clean, organize and update the Fellowship Room to display the history of Union Congregational as well as making the room an inviting rental venue for gatherings and receptions. A suggested rental price was \$300 for a larger reunion if use of the kitchen were included.

The meeting was adjourned with the Lord's Prayer.
